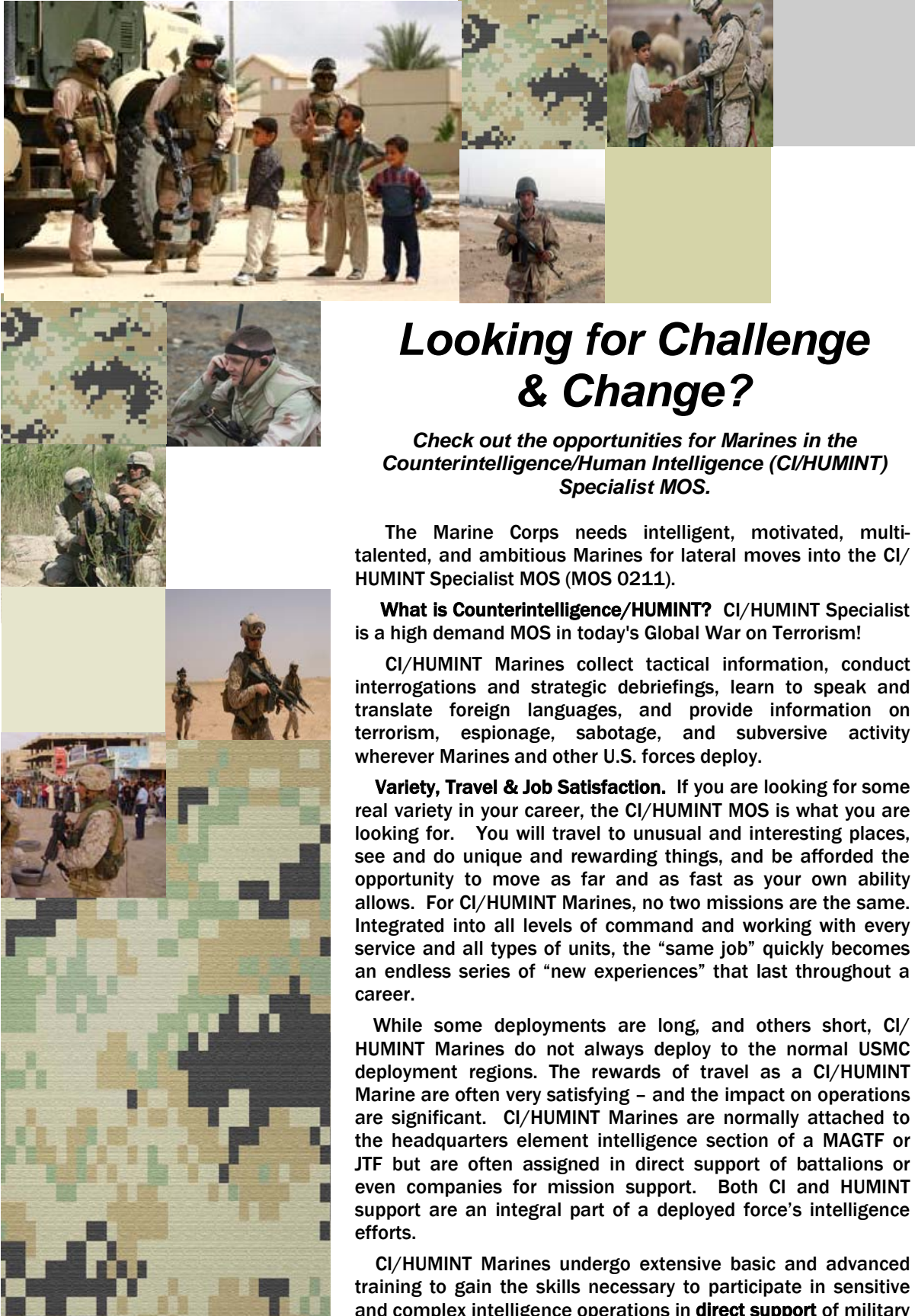


Counterintelligence/Human Intelligence Marine



Looking for Challenge & Change?

Check out the opportunities for Marines in the Counterintelligence/Human Intelligence (CI/HUMINT) Specialist MOS.

The Marine Corps needs intelligent, motivated, multi-talented, and ambitious Marines for lateral moves into the CI/HUMINT Specialist MOS (MOS 0211).

What is Counterintelligence/HUMINT? CI/HUMINT Specialist is a high demand MOS in today's Global War on Terrorism!

CI/HUMINT Marines collect tactical information, conduct interrogations and strategic debriefings, learn to speak and translate foreign languages, and provide information on terrorism, espionage, sabotage, and subversive activity wherever Marines and other U.S. forces deploy.

Variety, Travel & Job Satisfaction. If you are looking for some real variety in your career, the CI/HUMINT MOS is what you are looking for. You will travel to unusual and interesting places, see and do unique and rewarding things, and be afforded the opportunity to move as far and as fast as your own ability allows. For CI/HUMINT Marines, no two missions are the same. Integrated into all levels of command and working with every service and all types of units, the "same job" quickly becomes an endless series of "new experiences" that last throughout a career.

While some deployments are long, and others short, CI/HUMINT Marines do not always deploy to the normal USMC deployment regions. The rewards of travel as a CI/HUMINT Marine are often very satisfying – and the impact on operations are significant. CI/HUMINT Marines are normally attached to the headquarters element intelligence section of a MAGTF or JTF but are often assigned in direct support of battalions or even companies for mission support. Both CI and HUMINT support are an integral part of a deployed force's intelligence efforts.

CI/HUMINT Marines undergo extensive basic and advanced training to gain the skills necessary to participate in sensitive and complex intelligence operations in **direct support** of military

forces. CI/HUMINT Marines are assigned to units within the Marine Corps to include the newly formed Marine Corps Forces Special Operations Command (MARSOC) and other services - in some cases, CI/HUMINT Marines are assigned to duties with agencies outside the Marine Corps, to include the Naval Criminal Investigative Service and at Defense Attaché Offices at a number of US Embassies throughout the world. Within the operating forces, Marines work in small teams of 2 - 10 members, and interface with all services and all occupational fields in every major geographic theater of operation.

Qualifications & Training. To become a CI/HUMINT Marine, you must meet the following criteria:

- Male Corporal, Sergeant or Staff Sergeant with less than 1 year time in grade
- At least 21 years old
- U.S. Citizen
- GCT of 110 or above (with waivers for well qualified Marines)
- Good performance record
- Eligible for a Top Secret / Sensitive Compartmented Information (TS/SCI) security clearance
- Take the Defense Language Aptitude Battery (DLAB) test
- Re-enlist or extend to have 3 years obligated service upon completion of the 16-week CI/HUMINT MOS School
- Be willing to submit to a Counterintelligence Scope Polygraph examination

In addition, each applicant will be interviewed by a selection board composed of CI/HUMINT Marines. Upon successful completion of the selection board, further coordination for re-enlistment and lateral move is completed with the applicant's Career Retention Specialist. Once the lateral move process is complete and the applicant re-enlists or extends, he is scheduled to attend the MAGTF CI/HUMINT Basic Course located near Virginia Beach, VA. The course teaches subjects including:

- Basic intelligence principles
 - Report writing
 - Briefing
 - Interrogation
 - Photography
 - Tactical communications
 - Surveillance techniques
- and much more...

From school, new CI/HUMINT Marines are assigned to an Intelligence Battalion at either Camp

Pendleton, CA; Camp Lejeune, NC; or Camp Hansen, Okinawa.

Life as a CI/HUMINT Marine - More Training & Unique Operations. New CI/HUMINT Marines can expect to put their new skills to work immediately after school - and acquire some new skills during the first three years of their careers. Routinely, CI/HUMINT Marines are assigned to Marine Expeditionary Units, Special Operations Capable (MEUSOC), Marine Air-Ground Task Forces (MAGTF), and support Joint Task Forces (JTF).

Specialized training that CI/HUMINT Marines may receive include:

- U.S. Army Airborne School
- Survival, Evasion, Resistance, and Escape (SERE)
- Technical Surveillance Countermeasures
- Other specialized training unique to specific mission assignments

After completion of the initial tour in the operating forces, there are opportunities to serve in specialized CI/HUMINT assignments in the supporting establishment or external from the Marine Corps. Most assignments require highly specialized training which is provided in conjunction with transfer to a new assignment. For example, he may have the opportunity to attend foreign language training at the Defense Language Institute in Monterey, California. Language training lasts from 6 to 18 months, dependent upon the specific language (Western European languages, for example, normally involve a 6 month course of instruction, while more complex languages like Arabic, Korean, or Chinese require between 12 and 18 months). Depending on the Marine's proficiency in his newly acquired language, he may be able to earn up to \$500.00 a month extra for each language (with a maximum amount of \$1000 per month).

Career Enhancement. In addition to PME and specialized training opportunities, the CI/HUMINT MOS is also the feeder MOS for exceptionally qualified and experienced SNCOS to apply for appointment as an O210 Counterintelligence Officer.
